It wasn't Santa but members of the Cedar Hill Firefighters Association who brought Christmas joy and surprise gifts to a Cedar Hill family in need.


After hearing that a local family was about to have their electricity turned off in late De-

Uptown Village sets opening celebration for March 12



The grand opening for the Lifestyle Center at Uptown Village has been set for March 12. The 725,000 sq. ft. center will include retail and office space. It is the largest shopping venue south of I-20.

Uptown Village at Cedar Hill will combine the best attributes of an openair shopping environment and a diverse mix of shopping and dining venues. Its unique design and superior location will meet the demands of the increasing population of educated and affluent customers in Cedar Hill and surrounding areas.

At a recent City Council meeting, Gail Thompson, the marketing director for the site, described some of the amenities included in the center: a 2,500 sq. ft. children's play area, a village green with an interactive fountain and smaller fountains, a chess and checkers set with almost human-sized chessmen, bronze sculptures and more. The green will have artificial turf and be petfriendly, she said, including water bowl areas and pet pick-up stations.

The public spaces are designed to integrate the center into the community by hosting many types of special events of interest to residents and visitors.

The shopping center will have five entrances, including from Pleasant Run Road, Cedar Hill Road, FM 1382 and Hwy 67.

Shelter starts chipping to help locate owners

The Tri-City Animal Shelter has started a new program in which all adopted and redeemed animals will be microchipped before leaving the shelter.

This will increase the number of animals that are returned to their owners if they are picked up as strays, because chipped animals will be easily identified when scanned.

The microchip contains data including contact information for the owner. Microchips are a superior means of identification because a collar can come off, but the microchip is implanted under the skin.

The Shelter does not offer the microchipping service to pet owners, but it is available at several area veterinarians.

Local alarm monitoring improves response times

Cedar Hill's 9-1-1 Center offers home and business alarm monitoring within the city of Cedar Hill. The Center uses emergency dispatchers to provide the quickest alarm response available.

Traditional alarm companies have an extra step which consumes valuable time. After receiving your alarm signal, they must call the local 9-1-1 center serving your area and verbally pass the information on to the dispatcher, who in turn dispatches the appropriate police, fire or medical unit to your home.

Using Cedar Hill's alarm monitoring service eliminates this extra step and reports your alarm directly to the appropriate 9-1-1 emergency dispatcher.

Household hazardous waste event provides safe disposal

On Saturday, March 22 from 9 to 11 a.m. in the High School parking lot the City of Cedar Hill will sponsor a Hazardous Household Materials Collection event.

Proof of residency is required. This is a free opportunity for citizens to dispose of unwanted household chemicals, lawn and garden chemicals and other dangerous items.

Accepted materials include: acids, aerosol cans, antifreeze, brake fluid, craft/hobby chemicals, degreasers, drain cleaners, fertilizer, fluorescent lights, herbicides, motor oil, paints/stains, paint thinners, pest strips, pesticides, pharmaceuticals, photo chemicals, pool chemicals, oil filters, solvents, transmission fluid, varnishes.

Unacceptable items are: ammunition, explosives, medical waste, propane and butane cylinders, radioactive materials (smoke detectors), tires, business waste.

For your safety and to expedite the unloading process, please bring liquid paint sorted by type. Keep chemicals in their original containers, place leaking containers in a second container of like material. If a container has no label, please make a label or clearly mark the contents.

Do not transport chemicals in the passenger compartment of your vehicle.

Unloading of materials will be provided at the collection event. Please stay in your vehicle.

Ordinary cooking oils can be hazardous waste

Cooking oil and grease put down a drain can cause serious problems with your plumbing and the city sewer system. As these materials cool they condense to clog plumbing and can block sewer lines, often requiring expensive cleanout.

Dump fatty foods in the trash, not the garbage disposal. Wipe grease from your post and pans before washing. After cooking, collect small amounts of oil in a paper towel and place it in the garbage.

For larger amounts of used oil, such as after deep frying, collect the oil in a container and bring it to the Household Hazardous Material Collection event for proper disposal.

Community News items are in the center column. There is information on the home page, with a link to the complete article.

Right column

On the right is the **Calendar** module that shows a few upcoming items on the home page, but click on "View All" and it opens a page of all calendar events sorted by department.
