### No watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. seven days a week from May 1 to Sept. 30

From May 1 to September 30, outdoor watering is prohibited between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Fines for violators start at \$200 for the first offense.

The City requests no outside watering on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays to allow the system to replenish supplies in the water storage tanks to be available during peak demand.

This saves citizens money because it helps

the City avoid purchasing additional water from Dallas Water Utilities to meet peak demand.

## Police earn state-wide award

The Cedar Hill Police Department has been honored by the Texas Police Chiefs Association as a “Recognized Law Enforcement Agency,” one of the highest awards of the organization.

The voluntary review process is a rigorous examination of the procedures of a police department that includes submission of documentation to the organization for review combined with a two-day visit by police chiefs from other areas.

During the onsite inspection, the reviewers rode with officers, examined randomly-chosen policies and procedures and met with the department’s management, including Police Chief Steve Rhodes and City Manager, Alan Sims.

Comments in the Summary Report after the onsite inspection and review included: “The Cedar Hill Police Department’s policies and procedures are one of the most complete and well written of the agencies in the Recognition Program.”

TPCA has recommended that CHPD conduct programs to instruct other departments in how to prepare for an examination.

# CHPD welcomes North Texas K-9 trials

Police dogs from all over North Texas got a workout in March at Trinity Christian School Stadium in Cedar Hill when CHPD hosted the Region 20 Canine Association certification trials.

It was a great opportunity for residents to see the vital role canines and their handlers play in modern police work. Many took advantage of opportunities to interact with the officers and their dogs.

## Community involved

A number of local businesses, organizations and individuals in the area supported the trials. In addition to contributions and the use of facilities, donations helped cover the expense of hosting the trials so that only a very limited amount



of funds came from the City.

Over two days, the dogs were certified in obedience, suspect search, agility, criminal apprehension and apprehension with gunfire.

The Cedar Hill Police Department—the only department in the Best

Southwest with a K-9 unit—has two police dogs, 5-year-old Jax and 18-month-old Titus, a rookie.

“The dogs are at their peak during that 2-to 4-year age group,” said Lt. Colin Chenault of the Cedar Hill Police Department. “By that time, they pretty much get that little bit of puppy out of them.”

One of the trials requires that a dog release a decoy when commanded to do so.

“Jax nailed it on the first day,” said Cedar Hill Officer Mike McCorkle, Jax’s han-

dlar. “Some guys come out here and do a lot of screaming [at their dogs]. We don’t do any of that nonsense.”

Cedar Hill’s other police dog, Titus, just completed a 12-week course in McKinney with his handler, Officer J.R. Podany.

“He’s a young dog, but he’s squared away,” Podany said. “We thought, ‘Hey, let’s go ahead and do this,’ and he’s done well.”

Both Cedar Hill dogs live with their handlers. “He’s just a regular dog at home. He’s perfectly sociable” McCorkle said. “We don’t do any training at home at all, but I can see that anxiety in him when I put on the uniform. He knows when it’s time to go to work.”

## Recreation Center Hosts Summer Food Program

The federally-funded Free Summer Food Program, hosted by Trutyme Enrichment Center, Inc., will be available at the Cedar Hill Recreation Center, 310 E. Parkerville Rd.

Meals will begin Monday, June 7 and end Friday, August 20. Hot breakfast will be served from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m., a hot lunch will be available from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m., and a snack will be served from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m..

This program is available to all children ages 17 and younger, regardless of family income.
