Garage sales help recycle & support sustainability

Let the City help promote your garage sale. Registration is free and it will get your sale on the list that is published weekly on the city website at cedarhilltx.com/garagesale or by calling 972.291.5100 x1090.



The garage sales online list has been growing larger each week. The City ordinance says:

Only three garage sales are allowed per calendar year at a residence.

Sales can last only 3 days, beginning no earlier than 7 a.m. and

A City ordinance requires yardsales and garage sales to be registered. It can be done online at cedarhilltx.com.

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No watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. seven days a week from May 1 to Sept. 30

From May 1 to September 30, outdoor watering between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. is prohibited by ordinance. Fines for violators start at \$200 for the first offense.

The City requests no outside watering at all on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays to allow the system to replenish supplies in the water storage tanks.

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Watch pets in the summer heat

With outdoor temperatures rising during the summer, remember, dogs and cats don't sweat like people do.

Pets pant in order to dispel heat, but it isn't a very efficient system.

Those with dark, heavy coats are much more susceptible to heat than others.

If your pet is sud-

denly panting much more than usual see the vet immediately.

Here are a few ways to keep it a little cooler:

- Encourage your pet to drink by giving it ice chips or ice cubes throughout the day. Many pets like crunching ice, and it helps get extra fluids into their systems.

- Get the cooling benefits of water, at least with dogs, by spritzing them with a hose or encouraging them to lie in a kiddie pool. Even sprinkling the grass where they play will keep them a



little cooler.

- Even on mild days, our pet's coat traps a lot of heat and holds it next to the skin. Putting your pet in front of a fan or, better yet, near an air conditioner will circulate air through the fur and keep it cool.

Most importantly: Never leave your pet in a closed car with the windows rolled up.

Signage for sales is also regulated. Each sale is allowed only 3 signs from noon Thursday until Monday at 8 a.m. They must not be in medians nor on utility poles.

Signs cannot be within 40 feet of an intersection. They must be at least 3 feet from the curb or pavement or behind the sidewalk if there is one.

Signs are not allowed in any state road right of way.

Fight the Bite Help prevent WNV

The City of Cedar Hill is partnering with Dallas County Health and Human Services and asks all residents to help reduce the number of West Nile Virus (WNV) infections this year.

The City is asking residents to join in the fight using a 4D defense.

Drain

Remove breeding sites on your property. Drain standing water, cover trash containers so they won't hold water, change birdbaths, pet dishes and wading pools at least weekly, check boat tarps and grill covers for trapped water.

Dress

Wear long-sleeve, loose and lightly-colored clothing when outside.

DEET

Use repellants with DEET or other FDA approved repellants and follow instructions.

Dusk to dawn

Be aware that mosquitoes are most active from just before sunset until just after sunrise.

Lake is also nearby.

Ayala's Bradford Park neighborhood — as well as an unincorporated area of The Woods neighborhood in Dallas — was determined to be the No. 1 area for city dwellers in the Best Southwest-Grand Prairie-Oak Cliff area, according to a data analysis by The Dallas Morning News.

The News conducted a survey measuring livability of neighborhoods, which found that residents in city settings value issues including safety, affordability and proximity to work, shopping and dining.

City Center planning

Spotlight on land use

Cedar Hill is a city that has it all, great location, quality of life and opportunities for economic development.

As the City continues to grow, it is important that planning is more focused and deliberate. The City Center provides an opportunity for Cedar Hill to do both.

Planning for the City Center is now focused on land use - the determination of needed and appropriate developments and where they should go. Based on a recent market study performed for Cedar Hill, in another ten years, the city will have the potential to support an additional:



- 250,000 square feet of retail/restaurant
- 108,000 square feet of office space
- 120-room limited service hotel
- 800 apartments
- 200 senior living units
- 150 single family homes
- civic/cultural/recreation/entertainment uses

The driving force will be the addition of housing stock to support future growth. Freese and Nichols performed a land use analysis, applied the data to the market study and proposed the following uses in the City Center development:

Uptown Village Square - Anchoring development on vacant land and an institutional use (school) on the triangular tract north and east of Wal-Mart.

Strayer University Mixed Use - Office and hotel space combined with an enhanced Uptown Boulevard that will give the street a parkway feel.

Midtown Plaza - Parking and restaurant plaza between the Government Center and movie theater (with future parking garage)

Belt Line Village - Small commercial and restaurant developments with a Main Street feel.

Downtown Community - A combination of lofts, a new single family home community to the south and a centrally located senior citizen development and community center near the former lumber yard.
