



## Residents recycle tons of E-Waste and shredded paper

**Ancient technology collected at the E-Waste event was recycled instead of going to a landfill.**

At the first ever E-Waste event in Cedar Hill, on Sept. 18, residents lined up early and kept bringing stuff for hours.

Several tons of old electronic equipment (computers, monitors, printers, TVs, stereos, etc) were unloaded as residents drove up.

Tons of paper were shredded on-site and loaded into a recycling truck.

Stacey Graves, Code Enforcement Supervisor said it was “a huge turnout,” beginning with residents lined up over an hour before the event began.

Collection was from 8 a.m. to noon but it took until after 6 p.m. for the vendor, Shiny Queen, to collect all

the E-Waste material.

Residents brought hundreds of TVs, large and small that would have cost them from \$10 to \$25 to recycle at a commercial site. For this event the City paid the recycling fee for TVs.

Shred-It was the paper shredding/recycling vendor and their truck was at capacity by the end of the collection time.

Graves said residents were very appreciative of this event and many asked when the next one is scheduled. Due to the cost of this kind of event scheduling the next one will depend on the City budget. Check the City website for information at [www.cedarhilltx.com](http://www.cedarhilltx.com).

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## Ballard named Fire Chief

City Manager Alan Sims recently announced, with pride, that he has selected John Ballard as Fire Chief for Cedar Hill. Ballard had been serving as Acting Fire Chief since previous Chief Steve Pollock left earlier this year.

Sims said Ballard “has impressed me” and his “performance as Acting Fire Chief has been strong and decisive.”

Ballard was named Assistant Fire Chief in 2006. He has been a member of the Cedar Hill Fire Department since 1987 when he joined as a volunteer.



In October of 1988, he was hired for the position of Firefighter Paramedic. During his career, Ballard has served as a Shift Officer, Lieutenant, Captain, Battalion Chief and Assistant Chief.

Through the Texas Commission on Fire Protection, John holds certificates as a Master Firefighter, Instructor II and Fire Officer II. Additionally, he is a Licensed Paramedic through the Texas Department of State Health Services. He has also attended the Texas Fire Chief’s Academy and graduated from Western Illinois University with a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Ballard assumes command of a superior fire department. In the last year CHFD year earned an upgraded rating from Class 3 to Class 2 from Insurance Services Office. That carries with it the potential for lower insurance premiums for property owners in our community. The higher-protection level rating went into effect January 1, 2010.

Homeowners and businesses are urged to contact their insurance companies to determine what discounts may be available due to the new rating.

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# City Council and CHISD Trustees meet to discuss common goals

At a meeting on Sept. 20 the City Council and CHISD Board of Trustees met in an ongoing series of meetings to unify the bond between the two organizations and develop common strategies for the benefit of the City and school district.

During the meeting members of both boards were able to discuss updated information about the district and the city.

Trustee Dr. Marshall said district employees and younger students may receive free flu vaccinations administered by paramedics from the Cedar Hill Fire Department. This is just one

of many partnerships that benefit residents by providing service at a reduced cost.

Superintendent Williams spoke about the substantial number of Cedar Hill schools that had improved in their TEA ratings over the last 2 years. That led to considerable discussion of the state-mandated TAKS test.

Mayor Franke expressed the City's "servant" attitude toward the district because citizens are interested in the benefits of a better school district and a better city.

He mentioned the cooperation already happening including the police departments, the frequent

communication between the Superintendent and the City Manager.

He relayed interest in partnership ventures at the public library and he discussed the need to work collaboratively on road construction as new schools are planned.

The two boards agreed the meetings are fruitful and they plan to meet again soon.

"Pink Out Day" in Cedar Hill is part of the "Care Enough to Wear Pink" campaign, which was adopted by the Texas State Association of Fire Fighters who are wearing and selling pink T-shirts to benefit cancer-related charities.

## Residents save with ambulance subscription

An emergency trip to the hospital in an ambulance can easily cost over \$700. To help residents deal with that cost, the City of Cedar Hill offers an optional ambulance subscription plan that reduces your cost for emergency ground ambulance transport.

For only \$60 per year the City of Cedar Hill will bill your primary insurance carrier or Medicare. Whatever amount is not covered by either one will be written off by the City.

This program covers ground emergency transport to an emergency room. It covers dependents living in your home up to age 25.

Citizens on Medicaid do not qualify for this program.

You can make your payment by check,

cash or money order. An installment plan is available which allows you to pay a \$5 assessment each month on your water bill.

### Alternate Collection

The City of Cedar Hill provides free access to the City of Fort Worth Environmental Collection Center so citizens can dispose of hazardous household waste at that facility. It is located at 6400 Bridge Street just off of I-30 and Loop 820. You may call the facility for information or instructions at 817.871.5257.

It is open on Thursdays and Fridays from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. and on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. It is closed on City of Fort Worth holidays. You must present proof of Cedar Hill residency with a copy of a current water bill or a valid driver's license.

### What's Accepted?

Acids, aerosol cans, antifreeze, batteries (all kinds, including car batteries), brake fluid, cooking oil, craft chemicals, degreasers, drain cleaner, fertilizer, fluorescent light bulbs, compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs), herbicides, household chemicals, motor oil, paints & stains, paint thinners, pest strips, pesticides, pharmaceuticals, photo chemicals, pool chemicals, oil filters,

solvents, transmission fluid and varnish.

The Fort Worth ECC will NOT accept ammunition, asbestos, building materials, butane cylinders, electronics, explosives, medical waste, PCBs, propane cylinders, radioactive material, smoke detectors, tires or TVs.

### Landfill access

With a voucher, Cedar Hill residents may take materials such as fencing, brush, construction trash etc. to the Waste Management landfill located at 1251 N. Central Ave. in Ferris, TX. The landfill is open from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday - Friday and on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to noon. You can call them at 800.772.8653

Free vouchers, which will grant admission for one pickup and trailer load, can be picked up by Cedar Hill residents at the Information desk at the Government Center. Proof of Cedar Hill residency is required via drivers license or a recent water bill stub.

Hazardous household waste is not allowed at the landfill.

### Disposal of motor oil

Please be responsible and dispose of used motor oil properly. Dumping it into a storm drain contaminates local streams and ponds.

Local disposal of used motor oil is available from most oil change businesses and auto parts stores.



For only \$25 a month you can have your home or business alarm monitored by the same professional staff that dispatches police and fire crews for the City of Cedar Hill.

Instead of your alarm notifying someone several

states away, this system connects directly into our local 9-1-1 call center.

Saving seconds can save lives.
