


Around the Neighborhood

Significant Incident

On December 9, 2024, the Cedar Hill Fire Department responded to a 90-year-old female experiencing nausea, throat burning, and arm pain. Her daughter reported that symptoms began suddenly 20 minutes prior and noted the patient had recently been discharged after a mild heart attack. An EKG revealed a bundle branch block and rapid heart rate, with no indications of an acute heart attack.

While being prepared for transport, the patient suffered cardiac arrest. Firefighter Davis initiated CPR, and Firefighter Dike delivered a defibrillation shock, established IV access, and administered epinephrine, successfully restoring the patient's pulse and breathing. Additional support from Engine 214 ensured airway management, as Engineer Griffin intubated the patient during transport.

The patient arrived at the hospital with a stable pulse and was later extubated. This incident demonstrates the importance of swift decision-making, advanced medical care, and teamwork in managing critical emergencies.
