
Around the Neighborhood



Another Life Saved by CHFD

On May 25th, Cedar Hill Fire Department units Medic 211 and Engine 212 responded to a life-threatening medical emergency at a local assisted living center (Will Chauncey, Mike Terry, Dezarai Spencer, Jacob Spataro, Dillon Herbert). The patient, a woman who had recently been released from the hospital after a seizure-related issue, was experiencing a prolonged seizure and was unresponsive upon arrival.

Seizures continued as the rescue crews provided initial treatment. CHFD crews quickly administered multiple doses of medication, secured her airway, and provided advanced life support. During transport, they gained emergency access to administer further care and successfully used a defibrillator when her heart went into a dangerous rhythm.

A stroke alert was initiated to our hospital partners, and the patient was transported to Charlton Methodist Medical Center. Thanks to the quick actions and expert care provided by our team, the patient survived and is now recovering in rehabilitation. This critical incident showcased excellent teamwork, adherence to medical protocols, and the high level of care our firefighters and medics bring to every call.
